Suggested Community Questions

1. You support guaranteed healthcare with no out-of-pocket costs. What steps can a state representative realistically take to move Michigan closer to that goal?
2. You've called for a higher minimum wage and a 'thriving wage.' What wage level do you believe is realistic, and how would you answer concerns from small businesses?
3. You strongly support unions. What policies would you champion to make it easier for workers in this district to organize and bargain?
4. Housing is central to your campaign. What mix of zoning reform, public investment, and tenant protections do you believe would help most?
5. You've argued corporations should not be buying up housing. What specific state-level reforms would you pursue on that issue?
6. You connect housing with infrastructure. What infrastructure gaps in Southwest Michigan concern you most right now?
7. You've criticized large data centers over water use, energy demand, and limited job creation. What standards or limits would you want Michigan to adopt?
8. You often frame your campaign around taking on corporate influence. How would that shape the way you vote differently from a typical legislator?
9. For voters who like some of your goals but worry your agenda is too ambitious, what would you say to them directly?
10. How would you prioritize between healthcare, wages, and housing if political reality means you can't advance all three at once?
11. What does 'working-class representation' mean to you in practice, not just as a slogan?
12. If elected, how will you stay accountable to regular people rather than party insiders or major donors?
